## **Researching Local History**

Interested in learning more about the history of your town, neighborhood or home? The Upper Dublin Historical Commission suggests the following sources for further information. In most instances, staff can direct you to appropriate resources for your inquiry or, for a fee, can conduct research on your behalf.

For properties in Philadelphia, Jefferson Moak's *Architectural Research in Philadelphia* is highly recommended (available from the Athenaeum of Philadelphia).

### **For Deed & Will Research**

Deed Research or "Chain of Title"

The best way to begin is with the current (or relatively recent) owner's name. Use the online link below or access at county deed offices, which should have a complete set of records on microfilm. Use the correct deed index to get the deed book and page number. Order the deed book or microfilm and use the "recitation of ownership" in this deed to get the previous deed book and page number. Continue this process back to 1784 in Montgomery County. Prior to 1784, use Philadelphia County deeds, patents, and warrant books. Mortgages can be researched the same way. Deeds provide names, location, occupations of owners, land survey data, names of neighbors, and references to buildings, topography, and water rights. Each name opens doors to further research.

Post-1784 deeds, wills, inventories, sheriff's dockets, orphan court records, road dockets, land divisions, legal records are located in various offices and buildings. Documents prior to 1784 must be researched in Philadelphia County.

The National Archives - Mid Atlantic maintains the historically significant Mid Atlantic federal records from 1790 to the present. The historical records, as well as select court bankruptcy records, are open to the public.

The **Historic American Buildings Survey/Historic American Engineering Record** (HABS/HAER) is a federal effort, established under the WPA, to document significant buildings, structures, and landscapes. Digital files are available at the National Archives. You'll find high resolution photographs and detailed drawings of buildings in Ambler and the area. **National Register** documents are available for review via **Pennsylvania's state historic preservation** page. National Register nominations often provide detailed information about a specific house, district and history of a person or area.

It provides the Philadelphia region with a resource of first resort on matters of architecture and interior design history, particularly for the period 1800 to 1945. It offers the online geohistory database of historic maps as well as the useful Architect & Buildings database.

***A Brief History of Fort Washington, Pennsylvania: From Farmland to Suburb***, by Lewis Keen and Trudy Keen, available from Amazon.com and the Fort Washington Historical Society

Revolutionary War historians know Fort Washington, Pennsylvania, as the site where George Washington successfully repelled the British before moving on to Valley Forge. The Fort Washington of that day featured a landscape dominated by farmland, but the beauty of the area and its proximity to burgeoning Philadelphia ensured that it would not remain rural for long.

Less than a hundred years after the crack of Patriot muskets reverberated through Fort Washington, the area grew into a thriving summer resort, and was well on its way to becoming an early Philadelphia suburb. As a playground for elite Philadelphians before the end of the nineteenth century, Fort Washington became the location for lavish summer homes and year-round estates. Soon a thriving middle class developed, changing the face of Fort Washington and producing dozens of grand Victorian homes that survive to this day.

Drawing on a wealth of original documents, this look at Fort Washington's colorful past provides an account of the people, events, homes and businesses that have made this area of Pennsylvania a prosperous and vibrant community.

ALSO:

**Philadelphia Land and Vital Records System:** A subscription-based system of the Philadelphia Department of Records which has scanned images of Philadelphia's deed books from 1682 to 1974. Though the images are not fully indexed, it is fairly easy to use for those familiar with Philadelphia deed records.

**Philadelphia Parcel Explorer:** A subscription-based system that provides interactive geographical searches for official current Philadelphia property maps as well as scans of the historical Philadelphia deed registry maps which trace property division and consolidation from the 1865 to the present.

**PhilaDox Historical Index Info:** A free system that contains images of the Philadelphia Deed Book Indexes from 1682 to 1976 and the Philadelphia Deed Registry Ledgers which details property ownership changes from 1865 to 1955 by Deed Registry plan and plot numbers.

**PhillyHistory.org:** A free system that contains images from the photograph collection of the Philadelphia City Archives as well as other resources, such as a database of Philadelphia street name changes.

**Greater Philadelphia GeoHistory Network (PhilaGeoHistory.org):** A free system that contains an expanding collection of historical maps and property atlases of the Philadelphia area and other sources such as city directories, industrial fire insurance surveys and historical aerial photographs.
